Serenity



Ben sent me over track 6 of this album 'One hundred Suns'. I believe this this to be the best track of the album. The fact I received this as a gift from a friend made me think at the time "Wow! I would of paid good money to use this song." For me, it perfectly put what was being portrayed into sound and I was in turn very proud of the scene and it will always have a special place in this writers heart.

Although this album has a definite dark side to it. It also has a softer more heartfelt side. Ben doesn't tap into this often but when he does it's always a perfect combination of melody and space within the music. I can see that Ben's philosophy is more is less. This usually signifies a lazy composer. However, it's always a breath of fresh air when you can tell that this has been done intentionally and that in fact every note in this album has been well thought out and has a part in the grand scheme of things.
